New Hampshire

Old Home Week originated in New Hampshire and the first seals were issued in that state for the 1899 celebration, the first in the nation. These were printed in sheets ten wide. The height is unknown. An inscription at the base of the sheet reads *These stamps can be furnished in any quantity by Chas. H. Stone, 3 Capitol St., Concord, N. H.* Oddly, this inscription is found even at the bottom of sheets when the Stone inscription on the individual stamps has been obliterated. Both statewide and local issues are known. The latest known seals were issued in 1950.
